

YouTube for Authors

Spend three minutes in the writing community and you'll hear about needing an author platform. After five minutes you'll hear about every



After five minutes you'll hear about every social media platform out there and soon think you'll need to take pictures of what you ate for breakfast last week. YouTube, however, is the quickest way to connect with your readers.

So many social media platforms want to boil down your words to a limited number of characters or a single picture. Blogs are good for longer discussions but if you want your readers to really connect with you than

outside meeting you in person YouTube is the answer.

The biggest problem I see when writers start a YouTube channel is they don't know their why. In most cases authors start YouTube to connect with read and find people who will like your books. Let me tell you a not so big secret. Readers don't care if you met your word count goal for the day. They have even less on an interest in if you do the snowflake method while writing or pants the whole way through (unless you write non-fiction books about writing.)

So what do readers care about?

They care about your stories, what inspires you, and other books similar to yours. Nearly every week I do the #ManuscriptMondays and talk about what happening in the story. One time I described how a loud motorcycle whizzing by inspired me to have one of my characters join a motorcycle gang. The biggest thing that draws new readers in would be when I review other books similar to my genera.

If you feel like taking the dive into YouTube, remember to create videos with your why in mind.

One Contest Win Leads to Another

Leah Hinton entered the WGT Flash Fiction Contest last fall. It was her first contest, and she won second place for her short story **"Blue**." Feeling a bit more confident, she entered the Mount Hermon Writers Conference and won a scholarship, which included mentoring with bestselling author James Scott Bell. Here is her account.



I was visiting my parents the week after Christmas. I received a text from a friend. She said, "You should enter the Mount Hermon Contest." Ding. Ding. Ding. Bells went off. I had forgotten all about it.

"Sure. When is the deadline?" "Tonight at midnight," she said. No pressure there. My parents

were taking a nap and my children were watching a movie, so I decided I would see what I could come up for a

contest entry while the house was quiet.

The entry was the first five pages of a fiction or non-fiction piece. I had doubts. I was writing this in less than an hour on my mom's sofa without a notion of what I wanted to write. I let the inner storyteller out and reminded myself I had done pretty well in the WGT Flash Fiction Content. I decided that maybe that second-place win wasn't a fluke, and I would perhaps be talented enough to pull something out of my hat.

I wrote my submission off the cuff. I'd love to say out of sight, out of mind, but from the moment I hit send, I was waiting and waiting, convinced nothing would come of it.

On the day the announcement was supposed to be made I stood in my kitchen and thought perhaps I'm not a writer. I was stirring a pot of chili when my phone buzzed. I learned I was a full scholarship winner. I was so excited I nearly let the chili burn (which in my house is criminal). The winnings included room and board and conference costs.

The Mount Hermon Writers Conference (MHWC) celebrated its 48th year this 2017 conference season. MHWC hosts writers from all over the world. Mount Hermon is nestled in the red woods outside Santa Cruz, California offering an idyllic artist atmosphere.

The conference is geared for writers at every skill level, and for every phase of a writer's career for writers of both secular and Christian works of fiction and non-fiction.

The conference attendees have access to free manuscript review, seven major morning tracks, 42 workshops, 1-on-1 mentoring, night owl sessions, individual appointments with editors and agents, agent/acquisitions editors meet and greet, free consultations with a professional critique team, and full access to editors and agents during each of the meals.

One of the highlights of the MHWC was my time spent in morning mentoring with James Scott Bell.

I had entered a second submission to the mentoring track team to earn the opportunity to work with James Scott Bell. He took on four writers for the conference. We spent the entire morning sessions each day writing and critiquing and brainstorming together. I was particularly excited, because Mr. Bell writes thrillers, as do I.



James Scott Bell is the author of the #1 bestselling book for writers, *Plot & Structure*, and is considered one of the top writing coaches in the country.

My afternoons, evenings and late nights were left for other programs

Besides participating in many of the workshops offered, I also bought the audio recordings of the full conference so I wouldn't miss a thing.

I learned so much about myself through this process.

Writing was never considered a noble pursuit in my house.

Growing up, art was discouraged, even frowned upon. It got in the way of existing. You were meant to get a job, put your head down, and work 'til you died.

I hid my writing when I was young and disavowed my true love of writing to live a 'normal,' as in acceptable, life. But a love like that never goes away. This conference proved to me that I have something worth sharing, and I should keep writing. The feedback was amazing. I didn't go (to the conference) to pitch a thing, yet walked away with big publishing houses asking for full manuscripts of books I haven't even written yet.

A challenge was issued by an acquisitions editor. She asked me to write a non-fiction inspirational, about my own life experiences,

in under 250 words using only one-syllable words.

I went back to my cabin and wrote the piece before bed. I found her the next morning, tapped her on her shoulder, and told her I had it ready. She loved it, and it went to press three days after the conference was over and has made the final cut for an anthology coming out this fall.

I'm building that ever necessary platform, and I'm going to keep learning.

Even though it has taken me the bulk of my adult life to get back to writing, I am meant to be in the trenches. I will keep writing and entering contests and communing with other writing artists. It's not just what I do. It's who I am. <u>www.AuthorLMHinton.com</u>
